With Winter upon us, it is easy to overlook the pleasures that our gardens give us. Many of us use this time of year to plan for next year's garden. I certainly do that. As you are thinking about improvements for 2025, may I suggest some lovely



books that I have read, that could be b han inspiration for you to plant gardens that include Native Plants, or to consider the role of wildlife in your garden, and also to provide easy to maintain plants.

I recently read the book Comfort of Crows, "A Backyard Year" by Margaret Renkl. Sandy Selden lent me this book, which I loved, and my Book Club read it this year. It is an inspirational, once a week diary of the author's backyard gardens.

Braiding Sweetgrass, "Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants," by Robin Wall Kimmerer, is a lovely book about Native plants. Each chapter is to be savored for its guidance in life and nature. I am currently reading another book by Ms. Kimmerer, The Serviceberry, "Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World." The Serviceberry Tree is one tree (among many) that puts me in mind of my dear late husband. He planted one next to my home that has attracted n umerous hungry birds each year.

If you would enjoy a plant biology book that reads like it was written by a kind uncle explaining the world to nieces and nephews, you will love this book: The Hidden Life of Trees, "What They Feel, How They Communicate," by Peter Wohlleben. Yes, trees do communicate with each other, and take care of each other, and share commodities with underground fungi. I highly recommend this book. I recently bought Peter Wohlleben's more recent book, The Power of Trees, "How Ancient Forests Can Save Us If We Let Them." I'm anxious to read this one. I imagine it will be similar to two other "must read" books...

Douglas Tallamy has two books I would urge you to read, well, at least one of them: Nature's Best Hope, "A New Approach to Conservation That Starts in Your Yard," and Bringing Nature Home, "How you Can Sustain Wildlife with Native Plants." Amazing research and gardening!

If you would like specific guidance on what to do for your garden and when to do it, try **The Wildlife Gardeners Almanac**, "A Seasonal Guide to Increasing the Biodiversity in Your Garden," by Jackie Bennett. I bought it this year and will dive into it this winter.

I hope you will enjoy a garden book in this planting planning season. Such a book may be a wonderful gift! You may even want to drop a hint to Santa that you would like one of these excellent books for yourself. Thank you all for allowing me to have the pleasure of serving as your President for the past two years. I learned so much, and loved being a part of PAGC in a leadership role.
